fact and fiction. There's a highclass remainder shop and a good second-hand one (with a lot of SF, occult and Arthurian material) side by side on the walls just east of the Northgate. The closest second-hand shop to the hotel, on the corner by the Watergate Street traffic lights, has SF only by accident. The other Oxfam shop, in Frodsham Street, has two shelves of SF. Ring for opening hours, which may not be the same as Bridge Street Row. There are three other charity shops in Frodsham Street, with little SF. The same applies to the two in Upper Northgate Street. There's another remainder shop near the top of the escalator from Pepper Street into the Grosvenor shopping centre. The only new bookshops are Waterstone's in Eastgate row South, and Smith's on Eastgate Street near the Eastgate.

### Shopping in Chester

Chester's two-storey shopping is often described as unique, but will be familiar to anyone who's used a shopping mall. Upper level shops are described as on rows—if someone says a shop is on Watergate Street, it's ground level; if Watergate Street Row, it's the upper level.

The larger chain stores are mostly on Foregate Street or in the Grosvenor Precinct; Eastgate Street, Watergate Street, Northgate Street and Bridge Street have a more eclectic selection of shops.

#### **Restaurant Reviews**

Raffles Oriental, 1-3 Eastgate Row, The Cross. Mediocre food, very lethargic service. £17.50 for all you can eat, and this does include crispy duck. The staff make every attempt to sell additional drinks and the food is very salty, hence your bill is likely to be a bit higher than planned. Go if you're very hungry and not too fussy.

Moules a GoGo produced a reasonable bowl of moules accompanied by the traditional frites and mayonnaise for a mere £6.95 (lunchtime price), though they too were a little slow. The availability of jugs of Belgian beer did make waiting more bearable.

Ruan Orchid, 14 Lower Bridge Street (at the top, on the right as you go downhill) - reasonably good but fairly pricey (we spent £100 for three people including desserts and tip) Thai restaurant. Note that the other Thai on Lower Bridge Street is closed for refurbishment.

Martin Easterbrook and Margaret Austin recommend the **Siam Restaurant** (Thai and Teppanyaki) at 32 City Road.

Alison and Steven's favourite Chester restaurant from many years ago is **Francs**, 14 Cuppin Street. This venerable and cosy Chester bistro has had a bit of a facelift so no longer has a bicycle on the ceiling. Shame. Set lunches (up to about 6pm) are  $\pounds 6.95$  or  $\pounds 8.95$  for two courses; a la carte probably about  $\pounds 20$  a head for two courses and drinks.

### **Bottle Dungeon**

The Club Lounge on the 3rd floor is available to everybody—but especially intended for families. It's a comfy nosmoking lounge with a telly. Please don't leave kids alone in the room but obviously there's no problem with parents sorting out a suitable rota with their friends. NB: there's no loo in this room so you'll want to water your kids before you go.

Late Drinker?

#### A Better Key Card

Once the cash bar closes, you need a pink key card to buy drinks and charge them to your room. You didn't get this when you checked in. See reception before you're pissed to sort it out and arrange credit.
