## Any Old words, Any Old Words

Mike Christie is spear-heading a project to collect cites for sfnal and fannish words under the auspices of the US wing of the Oxford English Dictionary.

It's a pilot project, and they're looking for high-quality cites of a wide range of words from sf, fandom, and sf criticism. As well as words used in science fiction, there are separate lists of sfnal criticism terms, and fannish terms. They also want suggestions for other words that ought to be on the list.

So, you too can haul out your obsolete video games searching for the word 'avatar' in the sense of a 'VR representation of a person' ante Neal Stephenson's Snow Crash in 1992. Or 'skyhook' (not Sky Hook or sky-hook) prior to Kim Stanley Robinson's Red Mars. Fun for all the family.

Cites from really well-known sources are better, of course, (for some reason, Heinlein juveniles seem to be particularly popular) but there are plenty of terms where any evidence will do. You would think, for example, that the many issues of Ian Sorensen's Conrunner would be pretty solid evidence for conrunning terms such as "conrunner". And Ansible 45 is an earlier cite for the fannish sense of 'condom' than their listing from the 1989 Worldcon programme book. I love this game.

# News from the 2005 Worldcon



#### Fanzines Received

There's been a few, in fact. But I

specifically wanted to mention a couple. Science Fiction Five Yearly 11, edited by Lee Hoffman, Geri Sullivan, Jeff Schalles and Terry Hughes, came out bang on time as usual, in glorious fluffy Fibertone. Fifty years after the original publication, it's still going strong. Much newer is zoo nation 1, which arrived out of the blue from neofan Pete Young. The strapline for this tiny perzine is "Steam Engine Time it Ain't", and that's fair. Lots of design, photos, a tiny Novacon report, a couple of rants, "why I am pubbing my ish". "what I've been reading lately", and loads of design. Oh, and small ads and a special issue one letter column. All very promising but could do with some articles in between all the nifty bits. Also in a tiny package, but pretty much just text, is David Levine and Kate Yule's *Bento*. The high quality of the writing is always the main event here, with the tiny format encouraging careful prose. David outlines the snowball effect of his writing career - perhaps we'll be buying his novels soon. Much bigger is the latest Challenger, with more great photos, this time of Guy's wedding. Challenger's well worth reading, and I enjoy large chunks of it, especially Guy's fascinating courtroom dramas. But Guy's relentless pounding after a Hugo gets tiresome after a while. If they dished out the fan Hugos to

the people who want them the most, I'd

have thought he was a shoo-in.

According to *Nature*, researchers in the US and Korea have invented a crystal that sounds suspiciously like Bob Shaw's most famous creation, slow glass, as described in the stories collected in Other Days, Other Eyes.
